


We have a great year planned for 2010 and hope you get a chance to come and see the many interesting things happening at The Wayne County Museum! Have a happy and prosperous New Year!



The 4-H Club-Celebrating 100 Years!

The Wayne County Museum had the pleasure of displaying a tree full of memories. Members of our local 4-H club came down to decorate the tree in honor of the 100th anniversary of the 4-H club. Each ornament has a photo of various activities that took place this year through the 4-H program.

The seeds for 4-H were planted in the late 1890's when several states responded to their charge under the 1862 Morrill Act to expand their extension activities to include youth programs. To that end, one-acre corn contests were organized for boys, ostensibly to teach farming practices and to demonstrate 'scientific' farming. The first 4-H program as we know it today began in Holmes County, Mississippi, in 1907 when a school superintendent organized 120 boys in a corn contest sponsored by the Mississippi State College of Agriculture. From this first joint venture of youth and university, 4-H work has become an important part of nationwide land-grant college extension programs.

North Carolina's First Nursing Home

Whispering Cedars Nursing Home—that was the name of North Carolina's first nursing home. Established by Mary L. Casey in 1933, the home was located at 1113 East Mulberry Street and ran successfully until 1946. Mary L. Casey was born September 25, 1888 to Benjamin and Hannah Casey. She married Charles H. Thompson September 25, 1916. She graduated from Robert McDaniel Memorial Hospital in Kinston, NC on May 20, 1915. She worked for Dr. William Smith as nurse and opened the nursing home with the encouragement of Dr. Grover Dail, Dr. DeLeon Best, Dr. Jack Harrell, and Dr. Ivey, all of whom attended their patients at Whispering Cedars.

Family members of the late Mrs. Casey called the Wayne County Museum several months ago in hopes of erecting a historical marker. Upon contacting the owner of the former nursing home, Mr. Ralph Gable, permission was given to move ahead. Plans are now in the works for the marker, purchased by the family, to be erected. Look for more details in the Goldsboro News Argus over the coming weeks.
