

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Old Waynesborough Society

The Old Waynesborough Commission completed 1999 with the adoption of a strategic plan that lays the foundation for both the Historic Village and the Visitors Center. Five teams are actively working to meet the goals that have been set by the Commission. A master plan is being developed by the Building and Grounds Team that will be presented to the Society at their annual business meeting in June.

The long awaited move of the Hatch House should be completed during the first quarter of 2000. The recent flooding that caused the moving company to divert their work to more humanitarian causes held this up. The village suffered major building damage but in most cases, repair has been completed. The Odd Fellows Museum was the hardest hit as it had hardwood floors. It should be ready for our annual festival on May 6, 2000.

We are still waiting for fill dirt from the DOT to take care of the Robert's School and some around the Grange Museum that will be centered on agriculture. The blacksmith log cabin is almost complete thanks to the Federal prisoners that have volunteered their time on Saturdays. The Neuse Correctional Facility has assisted with the brick and mortar work on the two recent acquisitions and the log cabin. We

should be starting the Tuscarora Indian Village in late January.

The Village is open everyday from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Sundays from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. We can always use volunteers to act as tour guides. We have recently had a girl's softball team volunteer for this activity. Bobby and Velda Faye Howell and our Historical Education team will train them.

Our Tourism and facility team is coordinating with all of the towns in the county to emphasize the historic aspects of cultural tourism. We will also emphasize Black History at our first Cultural Affairs festival in the park on Saturday, February 5. This is being put together by three of our teams and the Welcome Center Staff. We hope that you will support this event and the Spring Festival in May.

Our membership drive is different than our parent organization. The Wayne County Historical Association. When our Strategic Plan is presented in June our drive will start with realistic goals for the money that is required to be raised. We will however accept donations and artifacts at any time. We invite you to visit our village at your leisure in 2000.

The Society received approximately 458 entries for several categories and of this number only 75 works were chosen to receive awards. "Olde Dobbs Trail," the newsletter of the Old Dobbs County Genealogical Society, was selected for the second consecutive year to receive a prestigious *Joe E. McLaurin Newsletter Award*. Laura J. Alley of Goldsboro is the editor of this award-winning newsletter.

Upon announcing the award, President, Elizabeth Bray Sherrill, read the following judges' collective sentiments regarding this entry, "This newsletter serves its members well. It provides them with space to ask their genealogical/historical questions; gives tidbits of information pertaining to Old Dobbs County; reprints old newspaper articles; states its purpose well; provides prospective members with an application form; lists publications that are available. It has been an award-winner with this group for several years. It has taken on a very professional look, is well-printed and is thoroughly enjoyable to read. The award was accepted by Charles B. Ellis, past president of the Old Dobbs County Genealogical Society and Director of the NC Society of Historians.


We are planning to have part of the exhibit hall dedicated to Black History Month in February, followed by the Korean/Vietnam War exhibit in the spring.

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C.B. Aycock Birthplace

The Governor Charles B. Aycock Birthplace celebrated it fortieth anniversary as a State Historic Site on November 6 with a commemorative special event which some six hundred visitors came to the site. One hundred and seventy-five visitors were Aycock descendants that attended a family reunion and enjoyed a barbecue buffet. Everyone enjoyed wagon rides, storytelling, living history demonstrations and music by a gospel group Centennial. Keith Stewart moderated a platform ceremony which included Deputy Secretary Betsy Buford of the Department of Cultural Resources, Jim McPherson, Administrator of NC Historic Sites and Rob Boyette, Chief of Interpretation for NC Historic Sites. Rob, who completed research on Aycock, focused on actions by various people to commemorate the governor since his death in 1912.

On December 7 and 9, the historic site hosted Candlelight Tours from 6:30-9:00 p.m. Primitive Baptist Singers performed a cappella in the site's auditorium. Costumed interpreters shared Christmas traditions, cooked over an open-hearth fireplace, performed a shadow play and served cider to the picking of a banjo, courtesy of Lynn Bull, to the delight of visitors. A total of six hundred and nineteen visitors attended during the two nights.

On March 24, C.B. Aycock Birthplace will host an Open House event in conjunction with the Fremont Daffodil Festival (March 25). First graders from Fremont, Northeast, and Northwest Elementary will be our special guests. Wagon rides, a petting zoo with lots of baby animals, and living history demonstrations will be featured.
