President's Message




Looking Forward to Serving


Thanks to Mt. Olive College for providing an intern, Eleanor Kominski, during May and June. The college will be supplying another intern this fall.



Guided Tours Magnify List's Needs


Charles Norwood, Sr. has conducted three guided tours of the historical sights and structures of Wayne County for the Architecture Inventory of Wayne Committee. The first tour, which was of the northern portion, was conducted on June 15, 1989. Charlotte Campbell, Ethel Twiford, and Charles Ellis accompanied Mr. Norwood. The second tour was of the south east section of the county and was conducted on July 12, 1989. It was attended by Frances Andrews, Ethel Twiford, and Charles Ellis. The third tour, of the Grantham and Rosewood areas, was held August 18, 1989, and was attended by Ethel

Twiford, Charles Ellis and Ann Frumphries. All three of the tours were recorded on audio tape and the last trip was also recorded on video tape plus photos of points of interest. This is very important because a number of the architectural structures have been destroyed or are in had dispepair and need immediate attention to save them from destruction. There is a great need from county residents for input and to verify the inventory list to incure that all the locations of interest are included. Plans are to solicit through the newspapers for applications to be considered by the committee.
